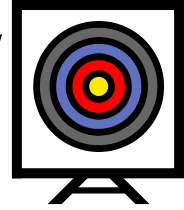

ON THE FIRING LINE: The Latest Club News

- **VOTE NO ON I-1639**

As previously reported here, WA State Initiative I-1639 sponsored by billionaire special interest individuals, would enact far reaching and draconian firearms regulations. After a court fight over initiative wording, the next hurdle for supporters was to collect enough signatures to actually place the initiative on the November ballot.

Based on check with the WA Secretary of State, as of August 2, 2018, Initiative I-1639 **HAS** qualified to be on the November ballot.

The final court decreed Ballot Title is as follows:

Initiative Measure No. 1639 concerns firearms. This measure would require increased background checks, training, age limitations, and waiting periods for the sales or delivery of semi-automatic assault rifles; criminalize noncompliant storage upon authorized use; allow fees; and enact other provisions. Should this measure be enacted into law? Yes [] No []

The full Ballot Measure Summary can be read at https://www.sos.wa.gov/assets/elections/initiatives/21_order_1639.pdf. The secret decoder ring full intent of this measure has been previously reported, but is included again under Hot Range, below.

Even after the NRA and others sued in Thurston County Court, and won, to have the Ballot Title and Ballot Measure Summary changed for more clarity, the ballot Title and Summary, are still **relatively harmless sounding**. And therein lies the problem!! The

average citizen whether a gun owner or not, will read the Ballot Title, and find nothing particularly objectionable. Let us be reasonable; in the face of school shootings and the enormous public pressure to do something to protect our children. Who can reasonably be against increased background checks, semi auto sales restrictions, age limitations and “safe” gun storage.

Make no mistake, I-1639 is not about “Gun Control”, it is about furthering the domination and control of the people, by the few, the wealthy, and the power seeking leftist elite. I-1639 must be fought with every breath, word, and penny we can bring to bear.

- **I-1639: The True Intent**

The gun control debate and particularly the successes of the “anti-gun” crowd often remind me of the fable of the “*Boiling Frog*”. The premise is that if a frog is put suddenly into boiling water, it will jump out, but if the frog is put in tepid water which is then brought to a boil slowly, it will not perceive the danger and will be cooked to death. The story is often used as a metaphor for the inability or unwillingness of people to react to or be aware of sinister threats that arise gradually, rather than suddenly.

Consider the National Firearms Act of 1934, *outlawed general ownership of automatic weapons*; the Gun Control Act of 1968, *regulated firearms sales and ownership*; the Brady Handgun Prevention Act of 1993, *brought us NICS checks*; WA Initiative 594 of 2014; *closed the (imaginary) gun show loophole*; and other similar actions by the government. And then consider adding I-1639 to the above list. It should be clear that the true long term intent of the anti-

gunners is the death of the frog. Surely that is the case, the abolition of private gun possession, by slow drop of increased restriction and government control, will also mean the loss of the 2nd Amendment, and the entire Bill of Rights. And ultimately the Republic.

- **I-1639: The Stand Against**

The backers of I-1639 are counting on voter apathy, ignorance and on the willingness to “do something”. But what can we the individual citizen do to stop I-1639? A few ideas.

1) Vote!! Election Day is November 6th. Please do not leave your ballot in the junk mail pile.

2) Get the word out. Struggle against the apathy and ignorance. Bring this issue to the attention of family, friends, co-workers. Don't forget social media!! Facebook and Twitter, may not want the opposition heard, post anyway. And for the well spoken, consider calling a conservative talk radio program.

3) Consider devoting time and/or money to the Pro Gun Lobby. The NRA and Second Amendment Foundation (www.saf.org) are obvious choices. But even in the short time since I-1639's inception, a grass roots Vote No on I-1639 has sprung into full fruition on the web. - **Washington State Initiative I-1639:**

The initiative, on the ballot, if passed, would do the following:

- Require a 10 Day Waiting Period for Commonly Owned Rifles. All semi-automatic rifle purchases and transfers would be subjected to a waiting period of 10 business days.

- Establish a Government Registry of Firearms. Current law states the Washington Department of Licensing (DOL) “may” keep copies of pistol purchase applications. The proposed initiative would instead require the DOL to keep copies of these purchase applications, and would expand this government registry to include semi-automatic rifle purchases.
- Require Completion of a Training Course to Purchase Rifles. This initiative would also require all purchasers of semi-automatic rifles to show they have completed a firearm safety training course within the last five years in order to proceed with the sale.
- Impose up to a \$25 Purchase Fee (GUN TAX) for Semi-Automatic Rifles. The Washington Department of Licensing would be allowed to charge up to a \$25 fee for each semi-automatic rifle purchase.
- Require Gun Owners to Lock Up their Firearms or Face Criminal Charges. Individuals would be required to lock up their firearms or potentially face a criminal charge of “Community Endangerment Due to Unsafe Storage of a Firearm” if the firearm is accessed by a prohibited person or minor. This intrusive proposal invades people’s homes and forces them to render their firearms useless in a self-defense situation by locking them up.
- Restricts Adults Aged 18-20 from Acquiring Modern Rifles. Adults aged 18-20 would be prohibited from purchasing semi-automatic rifles and would not be allowed to receive them through a transfer or loan. The proposed initiative would deny a segment of law-abiding adults from access to the most modern and effective firearms for self-defense, thus depriving them of their constitutional rights.
- Require “Warnings” for Firearm Purchases. All firearm purchases would come with a notification about the “inherent risks” of firearm ownership as an attempt to further stigmatize firearms.

- **NRA sues to block vote on Washington’s gun safety initiative**

The National Rifle Association is going to court in a bid to block a statewide vote on Initiative 1639, the gun safety initiative, by challenging as “fraudulent” ballot petitions on which advocates collected 378,085 signatures.

A second lawsuit was filed in Thurston County Superior Court by Allan Gottlieb, founder of two Gun Lobby groups, the Second Amendment Foundation and the Citizens Committee to Bear Arms.

The suits were filed within minutes of when Secretary of State Kim Wyman certified I-1639 for the state’s November ballot.

The Gun Lobby has claimed that the print was so small that those signing ballot petitions that the initiative was unreadable. “This challenge maintains that because the initiative petitions were incorrectly printed, there isn’t a valid signature on them,” claimed Gottlieb.

The gun groups face a harsh reality, their third electoral defeat in Washington in the past five years. They are being out-organized and outgunned.

After the Legislature refused to act, Washington voters in 2014 passed I-594, closing the “gun show loophole” and requiring criminal background checks for those purchasing firearms at gun shows or on-line.

After the Legislature refused to act, voters in 2016 approved extreme risk protection orders, allowing courts to temporarily disarm those determined to pose a risk to family members, friends and law enforcement.

The leaders of the Legislature refused to bring to the floor legislation again this year. The Alliance for Gun Responsibility responded with I-1639. It needed 259,000 valid voter signatures to make the ballot.

The measure raises from 18 to 21 the minimum age for purchasing semi-automatic assault weapons. A waiting period of 10 days is required for purchase of semi-automatic weapons. The initiative mandates gun safety training for owners.

The pro-1639 forces have deep pockets: Seattle Seahawks owner Paul Allen and entrepreneur Nick Hanauer and wife Lenore each kicked in \$1.2 million to fuel the

signature campaign. Other prominent gun safety supporters include LA Clippers owner Steve Ballmer and wife Connie.

In 1997, the NRA was able to draw a bead on a statewide initiative, requiring gun safety training and safe storage of firearms, and defeat it with a seven-figure media blitz.

The tables are now turned. Filings with the state Public Disclosure Commission show only a small \$25,000 donation by the NRA toward beating the initiative.

Hence, the Gun Lobby goes to court.

"Secretary of State Wyman has a legal and constitutional duty to reject all I-1639 signatures obtained using fraudulent copies of this initiative," the NRA's chief lobbyist Chris Cox said in a statement.

Backers of I-1639 put off a response to the lawsuits, and instead focused on their intense, 25-day signature campaign to get onto the state's November ballot.

"We are excited to have earned the opportunity to knock on doors in every neighborhood across the state to share why we believe this initiative will save lives -- and that's exactly what we'll do," said I-1639 campaign manager Stephen Paolini.

The state's gun safety movement grew initially as a clergy response to the massacre of 20 first-graders at a Connecticut elementary school in December of 2012.

It has received a major infusion of support and enthusiasm from high school students, in Seattle and elsewhere, responding to the mass murder of 13 students and four administrators at a Parkland, Florida, high school in February.

Thousands of students turned out to protest at the one-month anniversary of Parkland, and the "March for Our Lives" protest in March drew some of the largest demonstration crowds ever seen in Washington.

Gun rights activists met in Washington, D.C., last week, as part of the Tea Party Patriots Action Conference, to ponder what to do about gun measures on the ballot across the country. I-1639 is the most prominent.

Paolini was less diplomatic with his words, saying:

"While Washingtonians like me were hard at work, the gun lobbyists leading the opposition to I-1639 were in the other Washington strategizing with DC insiders,

rubbing elbows with bigwigs like (Sen.) Ted Cruz, and talking about how to stop safer gun laws here.

"Maybe if they spent a little more time here, listening to the people of Washington, they'd understand that we're ready to take action to make our state, our schools and our communities safer from the terror of gun violence."

- **King County Unveils "Common Sense" Action Plan: Ban "Semi-automatic, High Velocity Weapons"**

In a July 23rd op-ed, Joe McDermott, the Council Chair of King County, Washington, introduced a multi-prong "King County Gun Safety Action Plan" aimed at reducing gun violence.

The plan requires that warning signs be posted at gun shops, as well as any place a firearm is sold or discharged, to advise about "the very real and significant risk to health and life inherent with firearm ownership." (The language of these signs is to be approved by the local board of health.) Second, gun owners will be required to securely store firearms and ammunition at all times and in all places. And, citing recent school tragedies, the third proposal instructs the County to collaborate with local youth to identify "youth-informed solutions" for reducing gun crime. According to one source, a failure to post the warning signage would expose violators to civil penalties of up to \$100 per day; a violation of the storage mandate would be a criminal misdemeanor punishable by jail time of up to 90 days and a fine of up to \$1,000.

Additional proposals put forward include an ordinance to compel the King County Sheriff's Office to destroy forfeited weapons in working condition and those that have been turned in by gun owners, and a demand that Washington State lawmakers repeal the current firearm preemption law. This would clear the way for even more drastic

“solutions.” Upon repeal of the state preemption law, the King County Gun Safety Action Plan will immediately impose a ban on the sale and possession of “semi-automatic, high velocity weapons” and “high capacity magazines,” and raise the minimum age for possession or purchase of a firearm to 21 years of age.

- **Armed Citizen Shoots Gunman Who Opened Fire at Back-to-School Event at Florida Park**

A citizen with a license to carry a firearm saved lives by shooting a man who opened fire at a Florida park over the weekend.

At a “Peace in the City” event in Titusville, FL., attended by approximately 200 people, a bystander heard the shots, drew his legal firearm and shot the gunman in the head. The gunman was taken to a local hospital for treatment, WFTV-TV reports:

“The shooting occurred at Isaac Campbell Park on South Street shortly after 5:20 p.m. when the shooter, whom police have not identified, returned to the park after a fistfight and began firing, investigators said.

“A bystander, who was licensed to carry a firearm, shot the gunman, police said. He was taken to a hospital with life-threatening injuries, police said.”

The bystander then waited for officers to arrive and cooperated with their investigation.

Local police expressed gratitude to the bystander for taking action to ensure the gunman didn’t injure or kill anyone:

“We are extremely grateful that nobody else was injured in this incident,” said Deputy Chief Todd Hutchinson. “This suspect opened fire at a crowded public park, this could have been so much worse.”

No charges are expected to be filed against the bystander for his life-saving heroics.

- **The Ruger 10/22 Takedown:
World’s Best Survival Gun?**

So-called survival guns—at least when confined to a discussion of long guns and, more specifically takedowns chambered in .22 Long Rifle—have come in a wide variety of designs from a number of major manufacturers during the past half century. There was the classy walnut-and-blued Browning Semi-Auto .22, a trim, tube-fed number designed by none other than John Moses himself. Then there was the semi-automatic .22 Long Rifle ArmaLite AR-7 (still living on as the U.S. Survival AR-7 from Henry Rifles), which cleverly stored in its own buttstock and floated. Another model with military roots was Springfield’s M6, a single-shot rimfire (.22 LR or .22 WMR) or .22 Hornet center-fire and .410-bore shotgun over-under design that broke open for loading or storage. And then there was the Marlin Papoose, another semi-automatic .22 that featured a barrel that detached by way of a threaded collar and, in later years, a fiberglass stock and stainless steel construction.



But not until recently did one of the biggest players in the market weigh in with what might well be the most robust, practical, potentially even tactical, take-down survival rifle ever. That gun is the now 50-year-old Ruger 10/22, which has been subtly re-engineered with a barrel and fore-end assembly that quickly separates from the receiver with a twist of the wrist. The 10/22

Takedown, already available in stainless steel, threaded-barrel and wood or synthetic stock versions, brings to the table the platform's signature attributes: legendary reliability, accuracy and aftermarket parts availability. And for what may be the ultimate argument-ending finale, Ruger's previously released and factory-sanctioned 25-round "banana" style magazine, the BX-25, has proven to be just as economical, available and unfailing as the gun it feeds. There's no question that all of the aforementioned survival guns have at least one salient feature that allows them to stand on their own despite the Ruger's weighty presence in the current marketplace. The Browning has class and an uncanny pointability. The AR-7 has a "gee whiz" factor and a remarkably short stored length. The Springfield M6 has a shotgun and is the thinnest of them all. And the Marlin offers rust-resistance and beats the lot for lightness at 3.2 lbs.

But in the end, the new Ruger possesses an overall combination of features that would rather strongly suggest it is the reigning heavyweight champ of lightweight survival rifles. But if you don't agree, why not; and which other contenders would you suggest for the title: "World's Best Survival Gun"?

READY ON THE LEFT: Classic Firearms

- **The Ruger 77/22: A Late Modern Instant Classic**

For those of us in the pre-Millennial Generations, we can remember when a plastic stocked new firearm was an oddity and not the rule. It was also a time, when a rifleman's rifle would have featured a bolt action and not a semi-auto action. And it was a time when almost all .22 rifles brought to market, were in one sense or another, light weight "Boy's Rifles", with some notable exceptions. My favorite exception and my number one candidate for a Rifleman's Rifle in .22 rimfire is the Ruger 77/22.

Introduced in 1984, the Ruger 77/22 featured a 20" blued steel barrel, without or

without sights; an excellent blued investment cast receiver, with integral ring mounts; 3-position side swing safety, hand selected high quality walnut stock, with checkered wrist and forearm; and the ubiquitous Ruger 10 round rotary magazine.



In the author's personal collection is a first year production Ruger 77/22. with sights.

With Ruger rings and a Simmons 3x9, the rifle tips the scale at 6lbs-2oz, and actually feels and handles like a centerfire big game rifle. This is a standard production rifle, yet the fit and finish are top drawer and the walnut stock has very nice figure throughout. Bill Ruger chose to follow the same outstanding stock style as found in big brother, the Ruger Model 77; meaning minimal drop at the comb and NO cheek piece. The rifle is an absolute joy to handle, shoot and admire. And accurate!!

Every once and while, Sturm, Ruger & Co. , under the leadership of William Ruger ,brought to market firearms that spoke to an earlier time and a simpler, slower pace of life. Firearms that were less about CNC programming and injection molding and more about craftsmanship and building something timeless. These early Ruger 77/22's are definitely of the same heritage Ruger Number 1, Model 77, Blackhawk and Mark I.

For the curious, I paid \$270, new in the box, at a San Diego gun shop, in 1984.

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE BYLAWS and STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES REGARDING THE ADOPTION THE NRA HOME FIREARMS SAFETY COURSE AS A NEW MEMBER REQUIREMENT:

BACKGROUND: The consensus of the E-Board and numerous other members is that the club should adopt some standard, for new members, to demonstrate basic knowledge of firearms safety. Throughout this past Spring, the E-Board and various members have proposed that new member applicants be required undergo an NRA Home Safety class in addition to the Orientation Tour. In fact, the 2018 New Members were required to sit for the NRA Home Firearms Safety Course. Although, this topic has received much discussion and planning it has never been formally adopted in writing by the General Membership. Specific changes underlined in red italics.

Therefore the following specific written changes to the Bylaw's/SOP's are placed before the General Membership for consideration and approval. Since these changes involve both BYLAW and SOP Changes, this must be a multi step process. The First Reading, discussion and amendment, at the August General Membership Meeting. Followed by publishing of the proposed changes in September SHOTWAD. Followed by a formal adoption vote at the September General Membership meeting.

BY-LAW Changes:

2.3.1. Members of the following classes of MRC membership are granted a vote in club affairs, a gate key, and, generally enjoy full club privileges. As Club votes, these members assume responsibility for the Club's welfare. In addition, Voting Members have certain privileges as described in the MRC Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) Manual. Unless specified otherwise in the By-Laws, references to members shall mean "voting members." A member following approval for membership and completion of their orientation, and NRA Home Firearms Safety class (or E-Board approved equivalent) shall be on a probationary status during their first calendar year of membership.

2.4.1.1. Associate Member: the commonly domiciled spouse and/or children (under age of 21) of a Voting Member (in good standing). Associate member must go through an Orientation Meeting and NRA Home Firearms Safety class (or E-Board approved equivalent).

Standard Operating Procedure Changes

12.2.1. Associate Members must have been given an MRC orientation tour and NRA Home Firearms Safety class (or E-Board approved equivalent) to use the MRC facilities on their own. [See also SOP 21.17.1]

12.2.1.1. MRC will issue an identification card to Associate Members that have completed the orientation tour, and NRA Home Firearms Safety class (or E-Board approved equivalent). SOP 21.17.11.

12.3.1. All new Voting Members have the responsibility to attend a mandatory MRC Orientation Tour and NRA Home Firearms Safety class (or E-Board approved equivalent), as described in SOP Section 21.17 before receiving their first MRC key and using the MRC facilities on their own.

12.3.1.1. The Tour, and NRA Home Firearms Safety class (or E-Board approved equivalent) shall also precede the new Voting Member bring any guests or Associate Members to the MRC range for informal, unscheduled activities.

21.17.11. Organize, and/or conduct the Orientation Tour for all new members, in a timely manner.

21.17.12. Coordinate with the NRA Instructors to provide an NRA Home Safety class at the time of the Orientation Tour or in a timely manner.

21.17.13. After completion of the Orientation Tour and NRA Home Safety class, issue key and membership card.
